Dr. Otto F. Linn Honored At New Library Dedication



Birds Eye View of the Life of Our Dean

In the year 1895, Otto F. Linn was just a lad residing with his family on the Cherokee Strip on the Northern Plains of Oklahoma. He received his grade school education in a little oneroom school a mile and a half from his home. On completion of the eight grade, he worked on his uncle's dairy farm in Marquette, Kansas, to earn his way through high school. In spite of his busy schedule, he completed high school in three years—he was very active in sports and made both the football and basketball teams.

In a little church called the Swedish Covenant, the boy, Otto Linn, was converted. During his senior year in high school, he dedicated his life to God's service and the Lord Jesus Christ became Master of his life.

Over a period of 23 years, Otto F. Linn served as evangelist, teacher, home missionary, preacher, student and foreign missionary to the Scandinavian countries. He received his A.B. degree in 1929 and his B.S. and M.A. in education in 1930. During the summer of 1928, at the Anderson Camp Meeting, he took Julia Lindell, whom he had met in 1921, as his bride. He served on the faculty at Anderson College for six years, and in 1935, he received his Ph.D. degree from the Divinity School of the University of Chicago. It was in the fall of 1942 that Dr. Otto F. Linn joined the staff at Pacific Bible College as dean of the college.

Dr. Linn is recognized by scholars throughout the United States as an authority on the New Testament and has written five commentaries. He served on the Board for the American Revised Standard edition of the New Testament published in 1946.

His greatest contribution came, however, when he was selected for his honesty, integrity, spirituality, and scholarship to represent the Church

DEDICATION CEREMONY

The dedication ceremony holds some elements of surprise as Dr. Otto F. Linn receives the honor of having the spacious new, red brick Library Building named "Otto F. Linn Library." The enthusiastic response to this proposed name from the students and administration alike, is expressive of the love and admiration unanimously felt for our Dean.

The name "Otto F. Linn Library" is appropriate in that not only did his untiring efforts make the Library possible, but the first PBC library was located in what is now Dr. Linn's office.

In the year 1949, the school possessed 500 volumes in the library, which was on the third floor of the Administration Building and until November 23, 1954, this area was known as the Pacific Bible College Library. During this period of five years, the number of volumes was ever increasing. Now our library boasts over 9,000 volumes. On the crisp, clear morning of November 16, 1954, the students and faculty participated in a book brigade. Each individual carried approximately six books at a time from the third floor of the Ad building to the new library structure until the old library was emptied and the new one beautifully lined with books.

We stand in heartfelt thanksgiving to God, our Maker and Provider, for opening the way and providing the means for His gift to us—"The Otto F. Linn Library."
